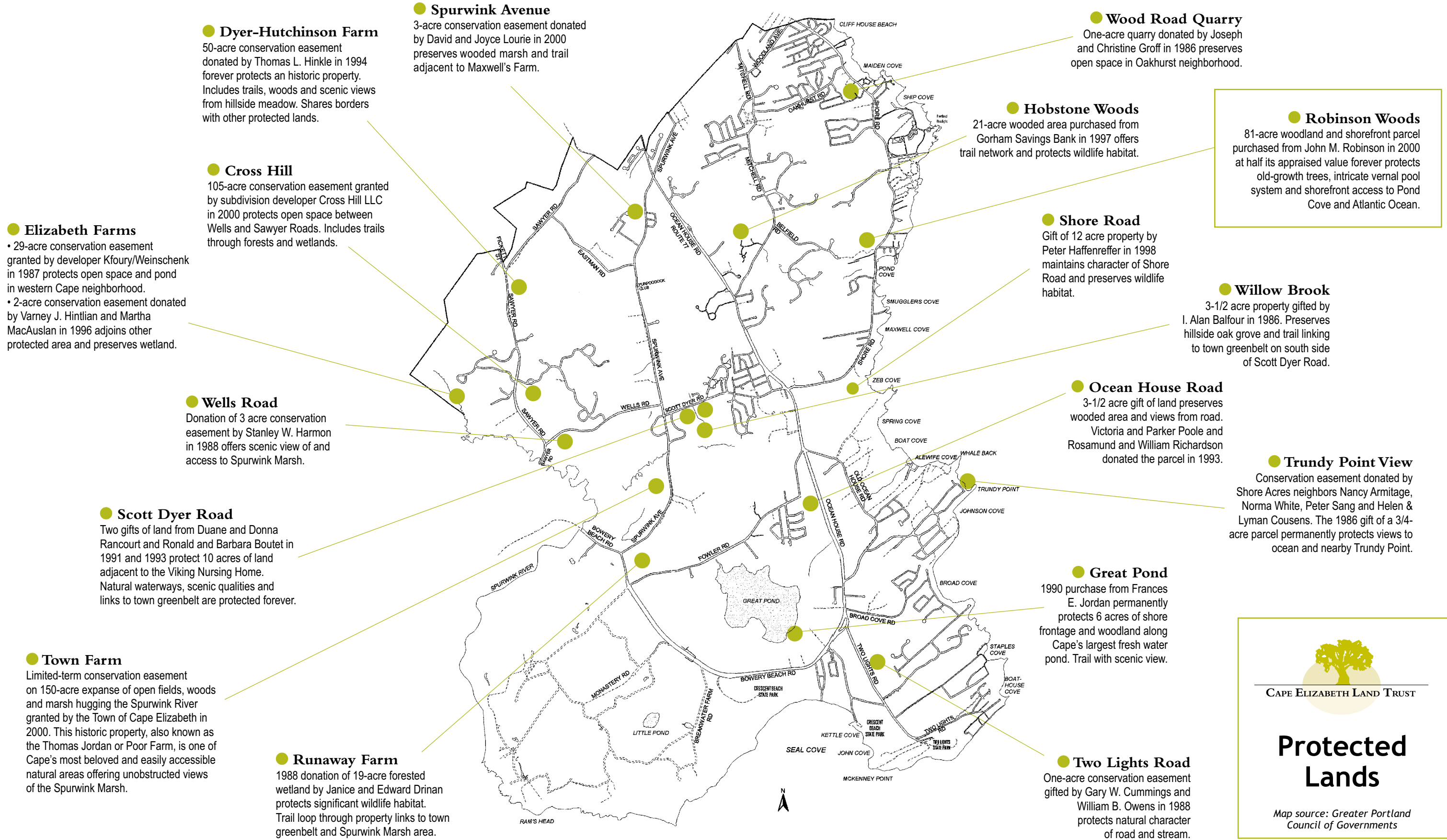


500 ACRES CONSERVED BY THE CAPE ELIZABETH LAND TRUST FOR THE COMMUNITY: 1986 TO 2001



Elizabeth Farms
 • 29-acre conservation easement granted by developer Kfoury/Weinschenk in 1987 protects open space and pond in western Cape neighborhood.
 • 2-acre conservation easement donated by Varney J. Hintlian and Martha MacAuslan in 1996 adjoins other protected area and preserves wetland.

Dyer-Hutchinson Farm
 50-acre conservation easement donated by Thomas L. Hinkle in 1994 forever protects an historic property. Includes trails, woods and scenic views from hillside meadow. Shares borders with other protected lands.

Cross Hill
 105-acre conservation easement granted by subdivision developer Cross Hill LLC in 2000 protects open space between Wells and Sawyer Roads. Includes trails through forests and wetlands.

Wells Road
 Donation of 3 acre conservation easement by Stanley W. Harmon in 1988 offers scenic view of and access to Spurwink Marsh.

Scott Dyer Road
 Two gifts of land from Duane and Donna Rancourt and Ronald and Barbara Boutet in 1991 and 1993 protect 10 acres of land adjacent to the Viking Nursing Home. Natural waterways, scenic qualities and links to town greenbelt are protected forever.

Town Farm
 Limited-term conservation easement on 150-acre expanse of open fields, woods and marsh hugging the Spurwink River granted by the Town of Cape Elizabeth in 2000. This historic property, also known as the Thomas Jordan or Poor Farm, is one of Cape's most beloved and easily accessible natural areas offering unobstructed views of the Spurwink Marsh.

Runaway Farm
 1988 donation of 19-acre forested wetland by Janice and Edward Drinan protects significant wildlife habitat. Trail loop through property links to town greenbelt and Spurwink Marsh area.

Spurwink Avenue
 3-acre conservation easement donated by David and Joyce Lourie in 2000 preserves wooded marsh and trail adjacent to Maxwell's Farm.

Wood Road Quarry
 One-acre quarry donated by Joseph and Christine Groff in 1986 preserves open space in Oakhurst neighborhood.

Hobstone Woods
 21-acre wooded area purchased from Gorham Savings Bank in 1997 offers trail network and protects wildlife habitat.

Shore Road
 Gift of 12 acre property by Peter Haffenreffer in 1998 maintains character of Shore Road and preserves wildlife habitat.

Willow Brook
 3-1/2 acre property gifted by I. Alan Balfour in 1986. Preserves hillside oak grove and trail linking to town greenbelt on south side of Scott Dyer Road.

Ocean House Road
 3-1/2 acre gift of land preserves wooded area and views from road. Victoria and Parker Poole and Rosamund and William Richardson donated the parcel in 1993.

Great Pond
 1990 purchase from Frances E. Jordan permanently protects 6 acres of shore frontage and woodland along Cape's largest fresh water pond. Trail with scenic view.

Two Lights Road
 One-acre conservation easement gifted by Gary W. Cummings and William B. Owens in 1988 protects natural character of road and stream.

Robinson Woods
 81-acre woodland and shorefront parcel purchased from John M. Robinson in 2000 at half its appraised value forever protects old-growth trees, intricate vernal pool system and shorefront access to Pond Cove and Atlantic Ocean.

Trundy Point View
 Conservation easement donated by Shore Acres neighbors Nancy Armitage, Norma White, Peter Sang and Helen & Lyman Cousens. The 1986 gift of a 3/4-acre parcel permanently protects views to ocean and nearby Trundy Point.
